PHASE 1 MONIGO 1	July 1942- September 1943	Fascist camp	Slovenian And Croatian Civilians	About 20 thousand, with an average presence of 2500 people	First Slovenian males, then families. At the beginning <i>repressivi</i> and <i>protettivi</i> *; from April 1943 mostly protective, even authorized to leave the camp for work.
	March 1943- September 1943	POW camp 103	New Zealand South Africa	Over 100 Over 500	jobs outside the camp
PHASE 2 ITALIAN- GERMAN BARRACKS	September 1943- April 1945	Possibly a German concentration camp	Hebrews	???	The documentation is currently seriously flawed

	May 1945 -1946?	Camp used for refugees from Venezia Giulia, Istria, and Rijeka region	Italians		Perhaps a part of the barracks was reserved for refugees
